- Bill was always working 2 jobs, too busy to get into any trouble. He is
 proud that he was able to work and take care of his beloved family.
- His first car was a Dodge. He misses that he can't just walk out to his car and just drive away.
- Bill's advice for life is, "If you are married never go to bed mad, never leave the house without kissing your partner goodbye. Take care of your family!"
